

My name is João Lazaro, and I'm a Brazilian artist and filmmaker who arrived in Newcastle in September 2023. One of the first people I met here was Peter, who works at the Contemporary Art Gallery on High Bridge Road. He said, "I know where you'll find your people: at the Star and Shadow Cinema."

So, I went there, and after being inducted as a volunteer, I began to understand how the cinema operates, participating in meetings and volunteering at events. I started as a technician and then offered to run a video production workshop, primarily aimed at volunteers.

I've been conducting workshops like these since 2015 and absolutely love it, so I thought it would be a great way to contribute as a volunteer and connect with fellow filmmaking enthusiasts. Initially, I received support from Steve and Anna Barbir to set up the events on the rota, and later, Carmel also helped.

It was surprisingly both difficult and easy. Difficult because, without a traditional management structure, it's hard to know who to consult to ensure you're doing things right. But it became easier once I realised how supportive everyone is.

After attending a few meetings to see if my workshop would be feasible and welcomed, it became clear that it had the backing of the other volunteers.

I set up the events in the rota, gathered registrations, and prepared the sessions. All three workshops I organised were fully booked, and I received great support from Dan, who is very proactive. He also helped facilitate the workshops, which I had to remain open-minded about, as our teaching styles and approaches to filmmaking are quite different. In the end, it turned out to be a fantastic collaboration.

I received positive feedback from all the volunteers and non-volunteers who attended, and we managed to create something from each session. Currently, we're planning new sessions focused on post-production, and if all goes well, I'll be hosting more workshops like this in 2025. It's exciting to create and film at the cinema because this is exactly what I had hoped for when I first walked through its doors. I wanted to make films with other volunteers, and now I'm working to make that a reality, with the support of fellow volunteers. To me, this is what the Star and Shadow Cinema is all about.
